Changes to the Omicron Phases:

You won't be surprised to know that after my last communication to you re Covid, that

things have changed yet again. Tonight we move into Phase 3. I have a Ministry online meeting this afternoon about this change for schools.

One of the biggest changes is around the definition of Close Contact for schools and the isolation time. The CTUT -Health Department spreadsheet required to be filled out for each positive case, is no longer required.

Those in a room for longer than 2 hours with a masked positive case are no longer Close Contacts, they are Casual Contacts. Casual Contacts are able to attend school unless they become symptomatic.

The schools toolkit will be updated and the information from the meeting this afternoon will be shared with you. You may be able to throw some paper off the fridge!!




February 22 Feast of the Chair of St Peter

Ecclesiasticus 27:5-8

In a shaken sieve the rubbish is left behind, so too the defects of a man appear in his talk. The kiln tests the work of the potter, the test of a man is in his conversation. The orchard where a tree grows is judged on the quality of its fruit,

similarly a man's words betray what he feels. Do not praise a man before he has spoken, since this is the test of men.

Gospel

Luke 6:39-45

Jesus told a parable to his disciples: 'Can one blind man guide another? Surely both will fall into a pit? The disciple is not superior to his teacher; the fully trained disciple will always be like his teacher. Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the splinter that is in your eye," when you cannot see the plank in your own? Hypocrite! Take the plank out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your brother's eye.

'There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit. For every tree can be told by its own fruit: people do not pick figs from thorns, nor gather grapes from brambles. A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart.'
